Regardless* of the weather or the distance, Paul Wilson will help low-income students in his neighbourhood arrive at their college classes on time.

A retired engineer, 76-year-old Wilson has been 11 free rides to college students for the past eight years. Since he first started volunteering his car to 12, Wilson has covered an amazing 64,000 miles, and has had countless pleasant and often humorous 13 with the students he transports to and from school. The students who he's driven have gone on to become physicians, teachers and engineers, but 14 they've also got from Wilson is finding a role model and a friend. Some students 15 call him "Grandpa".

Tina Stern 16 rides from Wilson for all her four years in college, and the trips meant much more to her than just 17 transportation. "It's not just a ride; you're not just sitting there in awkward* silence or with your headphones 18," Stern said. "He asks you questions and actually remembers the answers, so the next time you ride with him, he'll check on those things."

Wilson first worked as a 19 through a student-support programme of the non-profit* organization, On Point for College. 20 the programme asks the members only to drive students to and from their classes, Wilson often goes beyond because of 21 the students' safety. If they run out of the things of daily use, Wilson will drive to the nearest store and buy what's needed. If a student gets 22 on the long drives to and from school, Wilson will buy them a meal immediately.

For many students, Wilson's help is not only appreciated, it's also totally 23 for them to be able to complete their college education. Some students don't have a car, while others have to 24 cars with parents who work six days a week. For them, riding with Wilson has allowed them to complete their education--but according to Wilson, he benefits just as much from the experience. "I love these kids," Wilson said. 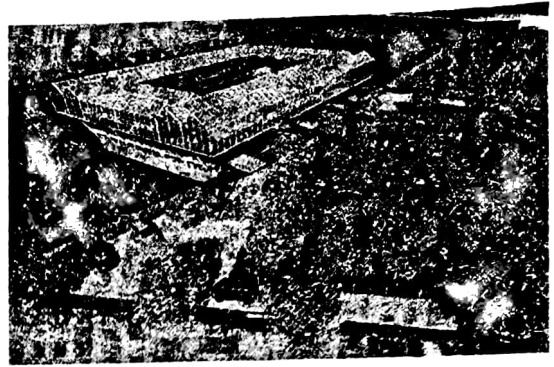

Floating Farm, the world's first dairy* farm on the sea, is now put into operation in the Dutch port city of Rotterdam. Thirty-two cows came aboard a few weeks earlier so they could get used to their new homes before they start producing dairy products. The floating farm is spread across three levels. The top floor is greenhouses where feed—grass, clover and other crops—for the cows is grown. The middle level is home to the enclosed cow garden, where the cows can enjoy eating grass. The bottom level of the farm houses production machines where fresh milk, yogurt and cheese are produced before being sent to local shops.



Will cows become seasick? Many people may wonder. The website of the farm explains they have designed a platform which is not likely to move. The maximum* shake of the platform is no more than a few millimeters in situations that will hardly occur. Even in terrible weather conditions, the cows will not feel any shake on the platform.

In addition to worries over cow nausea, there's also a larger question of why. Why build a dairy farm on the water—and in the middle of a major European city? With less arable* land and a growing population, Beladon, the developer of the farm, recognizes it is difficult to keep up with the need for dairy products. The train is also getting longer, with food traveling further to get to its destination. The floating farm aims to help cities produce more food in closer areas. "Seventy percent of the face of the Earth is water. A floating farm is a good way to produce fresh dairy products next to the cities. Floating Farm can bring fresh, healthy food closer to the cities while reducing environmental and economic effects associated with transporting food long distances," said Minke van Wingerden, a partner of Beladon.

Terrafugia Inc. said Monday that its new flying car has completed its first flight, bringing the company closer to its goal of selling the flying car within the next year. The vehicle named the Transition has two seats and wings that fold up so it can be driven like a car. The drive mode can be changed to flight mode in a minute with just the push of a button. The Transition, which flew at 1,400 feet for eight minutes last month, can reach around 70 miles per hour on the road and it gets 35 miles per gallon. In the air, the Transition reaches 115 in the flies using a 23-gallon tank* of gas and burns 5 gallons per hour. The Transition is bringing the dream of the flying car to life.



Around 100 people have already put down a \$10,000 deposit* to get a Transition when they go on sale, and those numbers will likely rise after Terrafugia introduces the Transition to the public later this week at the New York Auto Show. But don't expect it to show up in too many driveways. It's expected to cost \$279,000. And it won't help if you are stuck in traffic. The car needs a runway.

Inventors have been trying to make flying cars since the 1930s, according to Robert Mann, an airline industry expert. But Mann thinks Terrafugia has come closer than anyone to making the flying car a reality. The government has already allowed the company to use special materials to make it easier for the car to fly. The Transition is now going through various tests to make sure it meets national safety standards.

Mann said Terrafugia was helped by the Federal Aviation Administration's decision five years ago to create a set of standards for light sport aircraft, which are lower than those for pilots of larger planes. Terrafugia says an owner would need to pass a test and complete 20 hours of flying time to be able to fly the Transition, a requirement that pilots would find comparatively easy to meet.

When Deborah Sampson was a young girl, she would not have believed that she would be remembered more than 200 years after birth.

Deborah Sampson was born in Massachusetts, US in 46 (十二月) 1760. She was the 47 (五) oldest of the seven children in her family. The family was so poor that the mother sent the kids off to live with friends and 48 (亲戚).
